- Ashe Memorial Hall, Tralee one of Ireland's most historic heritage buildings, is set to undergo a major refurbishment to transform it into a multi-purpose civic facility with a redesigned museum, an immersive medieval experience, and a new community roof sanctuary garden that will provide spectacular views of the surrounding area and, as Kerry County Council phrased it, "connects land, air and sea with this iconic civil landmark building in the heart of Tralee".
 - The construction of Ashe Memorial Hall commenced in 1924 and was officially opened in 1928, standing as one of the earliest civic buildings constructed under the Irish Free State. The building symbolises National pride and cultural resilience and its prominent location reinforces its architectural and symbolic significance. As it approaches its centenary in 2028, this landmark project will honour its remarkable legacy while preparing it for a new chapter.

- Materford City & County Council was awarded €7 million under THRIVE Strand 2. This funding will be utilised to regenerate the largest early 18th Century townhouse, on one of the oldest streets in Waterford City's Viking Triangle, "18 Lady Lane" which is currently vacant and derelict. Using the Town Centre First approach and incorporating ongoing citizen and stakeholder engagement and an iterative process, the end use and design for 18 Lady Lane was co-created.
 - 18 Lady Lane will be converted into a children's visitor attraction called Tir na nÓg @ Lady Lane. Tir na nÓg is Irish for the land of young people. This visitor attraction will create a magical journey of discovery celebrating children's past, present and future while conserving the original fabric and decorative internal features of the building to ensure authenticity is retained. It will provide interactive opportunities for young people to become mini explores, encourage critical thinking by participating as a detective or an archaeologist, it will provide interactive exhibits that allow young people to see, read, touch and experience going beyond textbooks to create lasting memories for all both children and adult visitors.

Meath County Council was awarded €7 million under THRIVE Strand 2 to regenerate "St Finian's Seminary Study Hall" in Navan's Cultural Quarter which is a rare example of an oval shaped building with planimetric design and is currently derelict. Significant local citizen and stakeholder engagement was undertaken to explore how this unique building could be preserved and conserved and transformed into a valuable amenity for the citizens in Navan in line with the Town Centre First Framework.

As a result of this co-design process the design plans were developed to convert this building into a new Community Hub and County Archive. The outdoor public area will be restored in line with the natural slope of the land to create a natural amphitheatre and along with the renovated hand ball alley will provide outdoor space for cultural and artistic performances and events and will provide linkages to other cultural buildings in its proximity and the historic town centre.

Cork County Council was awarded €7 million under THRIVE Strand 2. This funding will be used to regenerate "Mallow Town" Hall" on Main Street in Mallow, which is vacant and derelict. Significant local citizen an<mark>d stakeholder</mark> engagement has been undertaken over the years to examine the feasibility for the building and create a design that would enhance the Main Street, provide a space for arts, culture, or activities and restore its significance as an important place for the community in keeping with the Town Centre First approach. The design is community led and proposes the delivery of a shared cultural infrastructure that is sustainable, socially inclusive and beautiful.

This design will see Mallow Town Hall being converted into a 200-seat theatre and multi-use arts centre. The current building will be refurbished, and a new link section will replace part of the existing building and an extension will be built to the west and south to provide the necessary accessibility and fire safety requirements.

Wexford County Council was awarded €7 million under THRIVE Stand 2. This funding will be utilised to regenerate the oldest building in Gorey – "Gorey Market House", which is associated with the foundation of the Gorey Town in line with the Town Centre First approach. This cherished building was identified for regeneration and following extensive engagement with a diverse group of local stakeholders and citizens, a co-created design for the regeneration of the building was developed.

In line with this co-created design, Gorey Market House will now be converted into a new community and cultural hub by opening up 3 of the arches on main street, regenerating the existing building, building an extension to facilitate accessibility to upper floors and the creation of new café to the rear.

George's Place, a three-storey building constructed in 1831 as a hotel and the detached, two-storey red-brick Washhouse, built in 1915, are both protected structures and are vacant and partially derelict buildings for approximately ten years. The regeneration will include a new three storey over lower ground floor extension to accommodate accessibility and the new biodiverse courtyard between the buildings will offer an opportunity to provide a visual educational demonstration of nature-based solutions for drainage, reinforcing the values of the New European Bauhaus.

This project will breathe new life into these historic spaces, creating a hub for creative learning and cultural activity that preserves the heritage of the site while providing accessible, innovative facilities for education and community use.

 - A protected structure, this detached single-storey Classical-style library, sits within the John Street Architectural Conservation Area. Designed in 1907 and serving as a public library since 1910, it remains an important part of Kilkenny's civic and cultural heritage.

This project reflects a citizen-led vision for regeneration, preserving a landmark of local identity while reimagining it as a vibrant cultural and educational centre for generations to come.

The proposal sensitively adapts the chapel into a multi-purpose venue with a main performance/exhibition auditorium, flexible meeting and workshop rooms, a café, and fully accessible facilities (including a Changing Places toilet). New public-realm works will open the site physically and visually to the town centre — for example, by removing sections of the old boundary wall to create better pedestrian linkages and an improved green public space. The aim is to retain the chapel's heritage fabric while inserting modern, accessible, and energy-efficient interventions.

A central feature is the creation of a Living Lab — a community co-design and programming model where residents, artists, schools and civic groups test ideas, develop services, and deliver cultural, education and social activities from the site. The Living Lab approach underlines the project's emphasis on participation, inter-generational activity and alignment with New European Bauhaus principles (beauty, sustainability, inclusivity). Public consultations informed the options study and helped shape proposed uses.

Economic and town-centre impact:

Beyond cultural value, the project will be anchor for town-centre regeneration: it will increase footfall, create jobs during construction and operation, support local creative enterprises, and strengthen links between the convent lands, Convent Lake, and Monaghan's retail/arts quarter. The investment will preserve an important civic asset while delivering long-term social and economic benefits.

The project seeks to redevelop the historic Station building, bringing it back to life with a vibrant community focused enterprise and social space. The Station House is under the ownership of CIE and has remained vacant for nearly 20 years. This project will include the redesign of the internal spaces and external renovations to repurpose the building as a multipurpose enterprise hub and social space. The building has pride of place on Vicar Street, however due to neglect over the years has fallen into a state of significant disrepair and is desperately in need of redevelopment.

... ABOUT **...**

The design of this scheme considered the architectural integrity of the existing building, its setting in the streetscape and within the context of the ensemble of protected structures located on the wider site. The proposed works have been designed to be sympathetic to this context and to promote the aesthetic of the Station House by drawing attention it's essential characteristics.

The proposed development and renovation will not result in any loss of significance or material harm to the Station House. It will conserve its status and enhance its appearance bringing it back into local use. The proposed renovation works will include appropriate measures to reduce carbon emissions and to improve thermal comfort for the building's future occupants.



The Fireplace Site Project will transform a derelict heritage site on Nicholas Street, Kings Island, Limerick City into the Forge Design Factory, Ireland's first Forge Design Hub.
